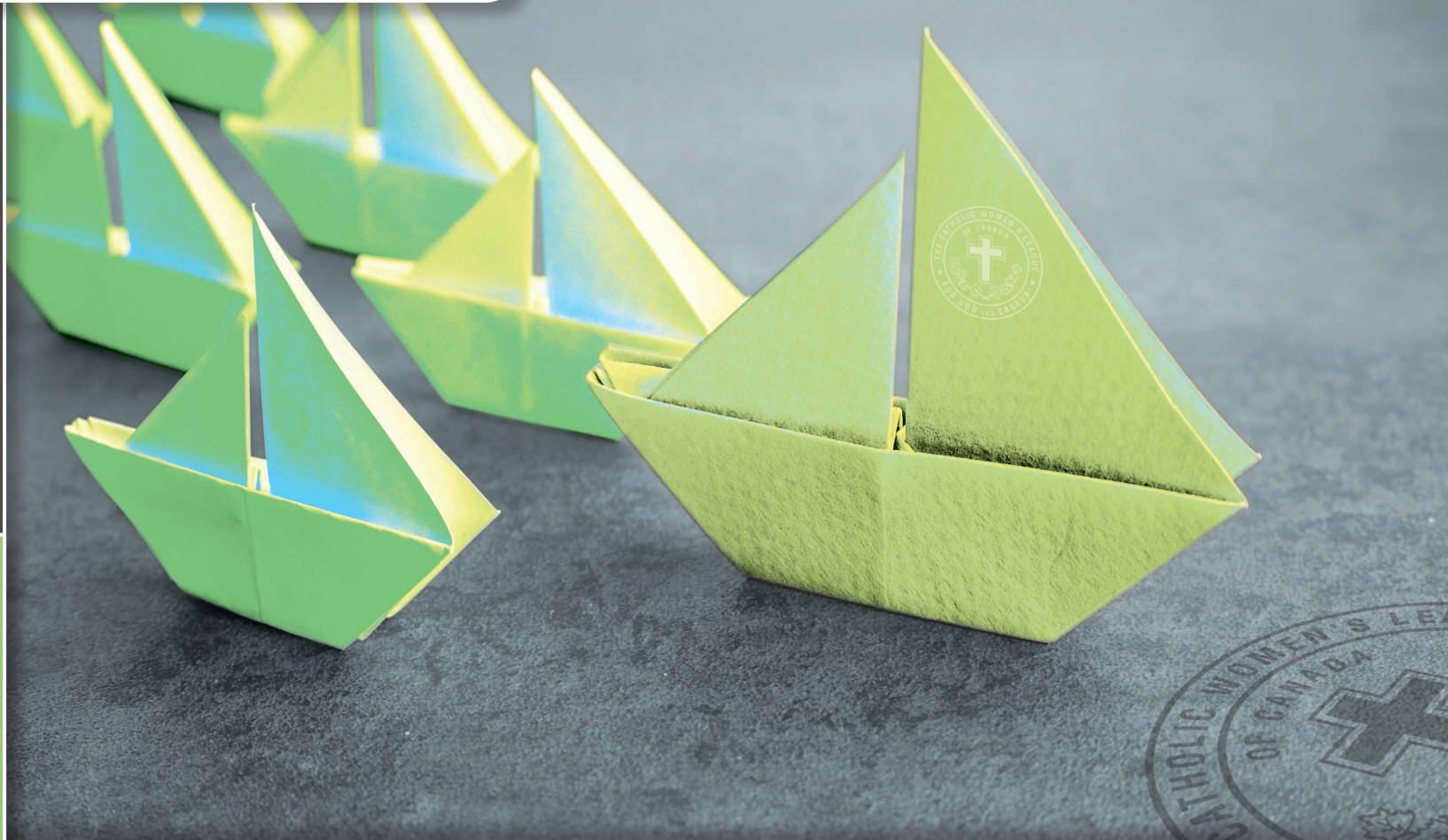


Life and Dignity of the Human Person

Introduction

The very first story in the bible is the creation story. The climax of creation on the sixth day is when God creates humankind in His image, “... in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them” (Gen 1:27). God gave life to all creatures on earth, yet it was only humankind that He made in His image. “See what the love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are” (1 John 3:1).

Human life is sacred because people were created by God, and they remain in a relationship with God. Where or when people are born, how rich or poor they are and what role they play in society does not

alter this situation. Human dignity is not something another person can bestow or take away from another. It is an inherent part of being created by a loving God.

The sacred dignity of life, bestowed on Catholics by their creator, is one seven key principles of Catholic social teaching and the foundation of a moral vision for society. Yet, in modern society, human life is all too often under attack through abortion, euthanasia, use of the death penalty, abuse of fellow humans in trafficking situations, environmental degradation, intentional attacks on civilians during war, cloning and embryonic stem cell research, to name a few.

As Catholics, members are called upon to uphold the right and dignity of each person regardless of who they may be or what limitations they may have. Pope St. John Paul II wrote in his encyclical *Evangelium Vitae*,

In a special way, believers in Christ must defend and promote this right [the sacredness of human life from its very beginning until its end], aware as they are of the wonderful truth recalled by the Second Vatican Council: “By his incarnation the Son of God has united himself in some fashion with every human being.” This saving event reveals to humanity not only the boundless love of God who “so loved the world that he gave his only Son” (Jn 3:16), but also the incomparable value of every human person.

This document will provide some tools and resources that councils need to be a voice in the world for the sacredness and dignity of life and to spread the understanding that people are more important than objects. Together, members will weigh each situation and examine every institution to see whether it threatens or enhances life and the dignity of the human person and will act with justice.

Catechism Paragraph	Quote
356	“Of all visible creatures only man is “able to know and love his creator.” He is “the only creature on earth that God has willed for its own sake,” and he alone is called to share, by knowledge and love, in God’s own life. It was for this end that he was created, and this is the fundamental reason for his dignity:”
357	“Being in the image of God the human individual possesses the dignity of a person, who is not just something, but someone. He is capable of self-knowledge, of self-possession and of freely giving himself and entering into communion with other persons. And he is called by grace to a covenant with his Creator, to offer him a response of faith and love that no other creature can give in his stead.”
362	“The human person, created in the image of God, is a being at once corporeal and spiritual. The biblical account expresses this reality in symbolic language when it affirms that ‘then the Lord God formed man of dust from the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living being.’ Man, whole and entire, is therefore <i>willed</i> by God.”
1700	“The dignity of the human person is rooted in his [her] creation in the image and likeness of God...; it is fulfilled in his [her] vocation to divine beatitude... It is essential to a human being freely to direct himself [herself] to this fulfillment. By his [her] deliberate actions, the human person does, or does not, conform to the good promised by God and attested by moral conscience... Human beings make their own contribution to their interior growth; they make their whole sentient and spiritual lives into means of this growth.”
1738	“Freedom is exercised in relationships between human beings. Every human person, created in the image of God, has the natural right to be recognized as a free and responsible being. All owe to each other this duty of respect. The <i>right to the exercise of freedom</i> , especially in moral and religious matters, is an inalienable requirement of the dignity of the human person. This right must be recognized and protected by civil authority within the limits of the common good and public order.”
2258	“ <i>Human life is sacred</i> because from its beginning it involves the creative action of God and it remains for ever in a special relationship with the Creator, who is its sole end. God alone is the Lord of life from its beginning until its end: no one can under any circumstance claim for himself the right directly to destroy an innocent human being.”
2261	“Scripture specifies the prohibition contained in the fifth commandment: ‘Do not slay the innocent and the righteous.’ The deliberate murder of an innocent person is gravely contrary to the dignity of the human being, to the golden rule, and to the holiness of the Creator. The law forbidding it is universally valid: it obliges each and everyone, always and everywhere.”

2268	<p>“The fifth commandment forbids <i>direct and intentional killing</i> as gravely sinful. The murderer and those who cooperate voluntarily in murder commit a sin that cries out to heaven for vengeance.</p> <p>Infanticide, fratricide, parricide and the murder of a spouse are especially grave crimes by reason of the natural bonds which they break. Concern for eugenics or public health cannot justify any murder, even if commanded by public authority.”</p>
2269	<p>“The fifth commandment forbids doing anything with the intention of <i>indirectly</i> bringing about a person’s death. The moral law prohibits exposing someone to mortal danger without grave reason, as well as refusing assistance to a person in danger.</p> <p>The acceptance by human society of murderous famines, without efforts to remedy them, is a scandalous injustice and a grave offense. Those whose usurious and avaricious dealings lead to the hunger and death of their brethren in the human family indirectly commit homicide, which is imputable to them.</p> <p><i>Unintentional killing</i> is not morally imputable. But one is not exonerated from grave offense if, without proportionate reasons, he has acted in a way that brings about someone’s death, even without the intention to do so.”</p>
2270	<p>“Human life must be respected and protected absolutely from the moment of conception. From the first moment of his existence, a human being must be recognized as having the rights of a person—among which is the inviolable right of every innocent being to life.</p> <p>Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you.</p> <p>My frame was not hidden from you, when I was being made in secret, intricately wrought in the depths of the earth.”</p>
2271	<p>“Since the first century the Church has affirmed the moral evil of every procured abortion. This teaching has not changed and remains unchangeable. Direct abortion, that is to say, abortion willed either as an end or a means, is gravely contrary to the moral law:</p> <p>You shall not kill the embryo by abortion and shall not cause the newborn to perish.</p> <p>God, the Lord of life, has entrusted to men the noble mission of safeguarding life, and men must carry it out in a manner worthy of themselves. Life must be protected with the utmost care from the moment of conception: abortion and infanticide are abominable crimes.”</p>
2272	<p>“Formal cooperation in an abortion constitutes a grave offense. The Church attaches the canonical penalty of excommunication to this crime against human life. ‘A person who procures a completed abortion incurs excommunication <i>latae sententiae</i>,’ ‘by the very commission of the offense,’ and subject to the conditions provided by Canon Law. The Church does not thereby intend to restrict the scope of mercy. Rather, she makes clear the gravity of the crime committed, the irreparable harm done to the innocent who is put to death, as well as to the parents and the whole of society.”</p>

2273	<p>“The inalienable right to life of every innocent human individual is a <i>constitutive element of a civil society and its legislation</i>:</p> <p>‘The inalienable rights of the person must be recognized and respected by civil society and the political authority. These human rights depend neither on single individuals nor on parents; nor do they represent a concession made by society and the state; they belong to human nature and are inherent in the person by virtue of the creative act from which the person took his origin. Among such fundamental rights one should mention in this regard every human being’s right to life and physical integrity from the moment of conception until death.’</p> <p>‘The moment a positive law deprives a category of human beings of the protection which civil legislation ought to accord them, the state is denying the equality of all before the law. When the state does not place its power at the service of the rights of each citizen, and in particular of the more vulnerable, the very foundations of a state based on law are undermined.... As a consequence of the respect and protection which must be ensured for the unborn child from the moment of conception, the law must provide appropriate penal sanctions for every deliberate violation of the child’s rights.”</p>
2274	<p>“Since it must be treated from conception as a person, the embryo must be defended in its integrity, cared for, and healed, as far as possible, like any other human being.</p> <p><i>Prenatal diagnosis</i> is morally licit, ‘if it respects the life and integrity of the embryo and the human fetus and is directed toward its safe guarding or healing as an individual.... It is gravely opposed to the moral law when this is done with the thought of possibly inducing an abortion, depending upon the results: a diagnosis must not be the equivalent of a death sentence.”</p>
2275	<p>““One must hold as licit procedures carried out on the human embryo which respect the life and integrity of the embryo and do not involve disproportionate risks for it, but are directed toward its healing, the improvement of its condition of health, or its individual survival.’</p> <p>‘It is immoral to produce human embryos intended for exploitation as disposable biological material.’</p> <p>‘Certain attempts to <i>influence chromosomic or genetic inheritance</i> are not therapeutic but are aimed at producing human beings selected according to sex or other predetermined qualities. Such manipulations are contrary to the personal dignity of the human being and his integrity and identity’ which are unique and unrepeatable.”</p>

Abby Johnson: pro-life activist, spokesperson and author

Birth: July 10, 1980

Abby Johnson is an American former clinic director of Planned Parenthood who resigned after witnessing an abortion on ultrasound. She has written two books *Unplanned* and *The Walls are Talking: Former Abortion Clinic Workers Tell Their Stories*. She also founded And Then There Were None, a non-profit organization that helps people who once worked in the abortion industry find new employment.

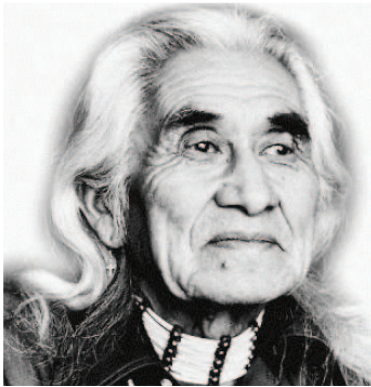

Benjamin Lay: Quaker Abolitionist

Benjamin Lay was born in 1682 to Quaker parents in Copford, England, near Colchester. As a merchant, he moved to Barbados in 1718, where he became exposed to the cruel practices of slavery and human trafficking through which many profited. He became very unpopular as he spoke out against these widely accepted practices. He did not believe humans were superior to non-human animals and protested against slavery by creating his own clothes to boycott the slave labour industry. He would not wear nor eat anything made from the loss of animal life or provided by slave labour. He continued his opposition to slavery and the human trafficking industry when he moved to the United States. However, as his position was in opposition to Quakers and most other Christians, he was unwelcome in many circles.

A prolific writer, Benjamin Lay published more than 200 pamphlets on slavery, capital punishment, the prison system and the moneyed Pennsylvania Quaker elite. He died in 1759, but his legacy continued to motivate the abolitionist movement throughout the early and mid-19th century, inspiring abolitionist Quakers to keep pictures of him in their homes.





Chief Dan George: a poet, author, activist and professor

Birth: July 24, 1899 Death: September 23, 1981

An easily recognized face in Canada, Chief Dan George was one of the first activists for Indigenous rights in Canada. He sought to increase understanding of the First Nations people among non-aboriginal Canadians. At the 1967 celebration of the Canadian centennial, he used his poem “Lament for Confederation” to draw attention to the European colonization of Canada.

Sr. Helen Prejean, CSJ: advocate for the abolition of the death penalty

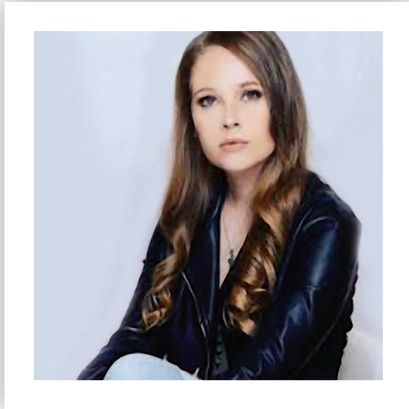
Birth: April 21, 1939

Laura Klassen: anti-abortion activist, founder and director of CHOICE42.

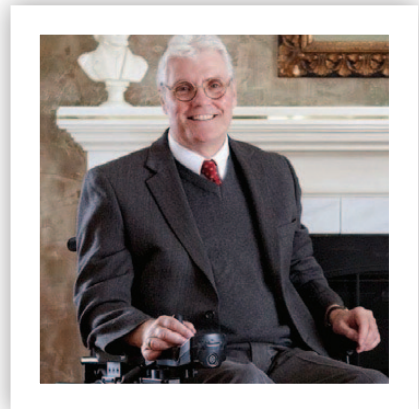

William Wilberforce: lawyer and member of the British parliament

During the Easter season of 1786, William Wilberforce experienced a spiritual rebirth and began to live as a serious Christian, abstaining from alcohol and re-accessing his political life. He became absorbed in the issue of slavery and began to work towards its abolition. In 1807 the British Empire abolished slavery due in part to his work, Thomas Clarkson and others.
